






WHAT IS A TRIAD?



A **TRIAD** consists of a three-way effort among:


- > Senior Citizens
- > Senior Providers
- > Law Enforcement

A **TRIAD** assesses the needs and concerns of senior citizens.

A **TRIAD** strives to reduce victimization of the elderly.

A **TRIAD** is a collaborative effort and each **TRIAD** program is unique to the area it serves.

WHAT DO TRIADS DO?



1. EDUCATE: Sponsor crime prevention and safety programs for senior citizens.


2. COMMUNICATE: Provide a forum for law enforcement and the community to share needs and concerns and develop solutions.

3. INVOLVE: Bring seniors and law enforcement together to develop community-wide solutions.

4. RESPOND: To the unique needs of its community and population.



WHAT CAN RESULT?



REDUCED criminal victimization of senior citizens.

IMPROVED quality of life for older persons in the community.

GREATER involvement of the community in implementing solutions.

FOCUSED attention to the crime-related needs and concerns of senior citizens.

ENHANCED delivery of services and programs which contribute to the safety of older citizens.
